



November is National Adoption Month.

Periodically, we need a temporary home for a baby while birth parents are receiving counseling and making up their minds about an adoption plan for their child. A Letter from Nancy By Nancy Rosenhaus, Associate Director



To all the parents who adopted through AWL from 1986 to 1992.

Your children are now over 21 years of age and as such, they now become our CLIENT too. We want to alert you that if a contact is made to Adoptions With Love from your son or daughter's birthparent, under law, we have to contact your child directly.

As parents, we understand that our young adult children, 21 or older, are still our children. But the law is very clear that we must contact them directly. We are not trying to bypass you, their parents. If you receive a call from AWL asking how we can reach your son or daughter because we have some information for them, please understand why we are doing this. If you have a special concern about your child receiving this information, please alert us so we will understand the situation better. However, we are required to contact them directly and we will encourage them to share this contact with you.

Some young adults who contact us tell us that they have shared this information with you already. Some say it is their right to privacy. We encourage you to have a conversation with your son or daughter about the fact that now that s/he is over 21, it may possibly happen that Adoptions With Love may be in contact with them someday. You can share with them how they may contact us directly.

We receive daily inquiries from young adults as well as birth parents who are interested in looking for one another. We have a SEARCH/REUNION program that has been growing in popularity. We also

feel that everyone who entertains the idea of searching must be made aware of the ups and downs of the process. It is a journey. We require that a young adult come to meet with us PRIOR to engaging in a search for a birthparent. There are many reasons for this, but mostly it is because young adults don't always know what the actuality of the "finding" may feel like. They don't have the life experience to look ahead, and a 21 year old typically looks at the present, not the possible issues that may lie ahead. It is our job to frame these out for them so they understand what issues may arise.. For this reason, we ask that they come in for at least one appointment. That appointment has a fee of \$125. This can feel quite steep for some young adults and they may need your assistance.

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Search and Reunion



Last Spring AWL teamed up with two local adoption social workers, Debbie Olshever and Ellen Glazer, to expand our post-adoption services. Debbie and Ellen offered a group for adoptive parents whose teens and young adults were considering connecting with birthparents or who were involved in search and reunion. This group was followed by a group for adoptees and focused on their concerns and questions, hopes and fears about search and reunion. Both groups were well and enthusiastically attended, and inspired Debbie and Ellen to launch the Adoption Connections Network and an accompanying newsletter, Shared Journeys.

Debbie and Ellen hope to see some of you at the first Fall meeting of the Adoption Connections Network on **DECEMBER 11**, **2012**. This will be a <u>parents meeting</u> at Adoptions With Love. The first Fall <u>meeting for adoptees</u> will be on **JANUARY 10**, **2013**. All meetings will be at 7:00pm to 8:30 pm on a "drop in" basis meaning you need not come to every meeting. Participants can come once or many times. The fee will be \$40 and those who plan to attend are asked to contact Claudia at Adoptions With Love 617-964-4357 by the Friday prior to the scheduled meeting. Meetings will be confidential but with participant's permission, Debbie and Ellen hope to include non-identifying themes and content in their newsletter.

Letter from Jessica about SEARCH



If someone were to ask me how I personally felt about adoption, I would probably have said that it was the worst thing that anyone could have done to me. Little did I know that it wasn't done to me, it was done for me. It took me 18 years to figure out that being adopted wasn't a life ending curse, but a life giving gift.

I found my birth parents 2 years ago on Facebook, not knowing that it would change my life forever, and not necessarily for the better. It caused so much pain and heartache not just for me, but for everyone involved, and I feel responsible for changing everyone's life as we all knew it.

My goal in life isn't to change young people's minds about looking for their birth families, just to tell them that it is okay to wait. I do not regret finding my birth mother and father, but I do wish I had waited a few more years. I was not mentally and emotionally ready to deal with everything that had happened, and after talking with a few other adoptees I know that I am not the only one who feels this way.

The analogy I tell people is a very true one. Kids believe in Santa Claus until some kid on the playground ruins it for them and says he isn't real. Adopted kids live life thinking their birth parents are these amazing people who are perfect, until one day it become finally apparent that they are just like everyone else.

Growing up, I thought my birth mother was Jennifer Aniston because she was my favorite actress. I loved dreaming about my Jennifer Aniston birth mother, and ever since the day I found out that my birth mother was no Jennifer Aniston, I wish I had waited.
